NEW SIGNAGE

As you might have seen, there are new signs at the areas of the pavilion, cleaning station and boat launch. The signs were needed as more and more residents that are not members of the Bay Harbor Improvement Association have been o observed using our facilities. The pavilion, fishing pier, cleaning station, and boat launch are for MEMBERS OF BHIA and their invited quests only. MEMBERS of BHIA paid dues to construct these facilities and pay dues to maintain them from wear and tear. "No Trespassing" is posted on the facilities' signage, as in neighboring communities, so that there is legal recourse, including Galveston police assistance, intervention is needed to remove trespassers, or if trespassers are injured on the premises. The Galveston Police non-emergency number is also posted, so if you witness a situation in the BHIA marina area in which police intervention is needed, you know both the 911 emergency number and can easily find on the signs the non-emergency number, whichever the situation calls for. If you see posts painted purple on any property, this also serves as a universal No Trespassing sign, but we know there is less awareness of that and signs allowed us to provide additional information.

Please invite any resident who is not yet a member and would like to use the marina area facilities to join BHIA. The dues is only \$150 a year and includes additional benefits.

Pretty safe to say bay fishing is still in recovery from Harvey. As is the entire Texas coast from Corpus to Sabine Pass. God Bless you if you're dealing with TWIA. Sorry, I digress. If you love to fish, I've got some great news. Fall fishing is on..., Fall catching...? Hmmm...keeper size fish are few and far between. There's been about a ten to one ratio of juvenile fish to keeper size fish. Red fish have been our go to fish and saved many a trip from the proverbial skunk factor.

Instead of calling this an excuse I'm going to frame this as my hypothesis. The fifty-one inches of rain, sixty inches in some areas, Harvey left behind eventually drained into Galveston Bay. Salinity levels fell severely. Seawater is classified as thirty-five parts per thousand. Galveston Bay water was tested at three to five parts per thousand for weeks on end after this one in every one thousand year flood event. Call me crazy, but I believe we didn't get our annual influx of tide runners because the fish new ahead of time that the deluge was coming. Adult fish that did enter the bay in the annual spring migration were pushed out by Harvey's fresh water influx. The marsh was also purged, pushing out all those juvenile fish (Trout & Reds) that normally grow up in brackish water and they remain in the bay today. Twelve to fourteen inch Trout and sixteen to eighteen inch Red Fish are the norm and that's a good thing. Baring a freeze this winter or another flood event this summer fishing should gradually improve to phenomenal beginning this spring and into next fall.

Fishing is not horrendous right now; you can catch some decent fish. There are many other positive aspects that go along with a fishing trip other than the number of fish in the box. In fact, I find there are very few people that are dissatisfied with a handful of fresh fish for dinner and a day on the bay with family and friends. How many Baggies of freezer burned trout do you need to throw away before you figure out that things need or have changed? Personally I've never seen a bag of frozen trout filets spawn into a bag of live trout. The days of filling igloos with fish as a way of feeding the family inexpensively are over. The expenses associated with fishing tackle alone can't compete with a quick trip to the local seafood market. Mother Nature herself regulates the resource. When's the last time you caught a limit of trout? Yes, you probably can point out that trip you limited out just a week ago or twice over the summer but that was four to six times two to three summers ago. The beach front is good for a couple of limits a year when the weather cooperates. A limit of Reds is within the realm of possibilities but that's three fish. TP&W claims one fish per person, per trip, is the average catch these days.

The hero shot with multiple ten fish stringers and decks covered in fish have become embarrassingly ignorant. If you spend any time on the water at all the last several years you realize the increase in fishing pressure and the reduction in your catch rate has been exponential. TP&W reports over the past ten years an increase of over seven hundred thousand saltwater fishing licenses sold and Galveston Bay is sixty minutes away from the fourth most populated area in the country. Do the math, the ten fish stringer for Galveston Bay is not sustainable. By the time TP&W reduces the ten trout limit to five it probably should be three. I would hope the very people who are the most passionate and knowledgeable about the resource would be the most benevolent. There's no law against catch and release. Maybe... Just keep five?
